A Streetcar Named Desire Context

A Streetcar Named Desire premiered three years later at the Barrymore Theater in New York City. The play, set in contemporary times, describes the decline and fall of a fading Southern belle named Blanche DuBois. A Streetcar Named Desire cemented Williams' s reputation, garnering another Drama Critics' Circle Award and also a Pulitzer Prize.
